### Grade 4 Discussion Questions and Literacy Lesson

#### Objectives: Learn about the importance of perspective.

**Discussion Questions:** 

- 1. What does perspective mean?
- 2. Why is it important to have diverse perspectives?
- 3. What makes people's perspectives so different?
- 4. What are some different points of view to tell a story?

First Person: The narrator tells their story to the reader. We see only their perspective.

Second Person: The narrator talks directly to the reader and addresses them with that second-person pronoun, "you." They tell us what to think.

Third Person: A third person point of view is a narrative that doesn't address the reader and doesn't make any mention of themselves. They give us an unbiased perspective.


- 5. What does it mean to have a biased or unbiased perspective?
- 6. Some stories are firsthand accounts. This means the person telling the story experienced the story's events themselves. Other stories are secondhand accounts. This means the storyteller learned about the events from another source. Do you like a person telling you a story they experienced themselves? Or do you like learning about a person through the research and gathering of facts by someone else?
