
## Winter Academy Discussion Guide Grade 5



2. If you were in Cruzita's place, would you feel frustrated or excited about spending the summer in a bakery and learning mariachi?


3. Why do you think Cruzita feels so strongly about becoming a pop star? How does her idea of being a "star" change as she learns more about her family's traditions and music?
